Boneyard: Refers to where a signmaker stores signs that are no longer in use.

Googie: A type of architecture that was characterized by Space Age designs, such as boomerangs and flying saucers.

Integration: Individuals and groups can interact freely and equally without discrimination based on skin color.

Neon: Element #10 on the periodic table of elements; glows a red-orange color when electricity is passed through it.

Segregation: Separation and discrimination based on the color of one's skin.

Yucca: A succulent plant native to the Mojave Desert.








